Pain Management for People with Serious Illness in the Context of the Opioid Use Disorder

Epidemic Jun 23 2022 The United States is facing an opioid use disorder epidemic with opioid overdoses killing 47,000 people in the U.S. in 2017. The past three decades have witnessed a significant increase in the prescribing of opioids for pain, based on the belief that patients were being undertreated for their pain, coupled with a widespread misunderstanding of the addictive properties of opioids. This increase in prescribing of opioids also saw a parallel increase in addiction and overdose. In an effort to address this ongoing epidemic of opioid misuse, policy and regulatory changes have been enacted that have served to limit the availability of prescription opioids for pain management. Overlooked amid the intense focus on efforts to end the opioid use disorder epidemic is the perspective of clinicians who are experiencing a significant amount of daily tension as opioid regulations and restrictions have limited their ability to treat the pain of their patients facing serious illness. Increased public and clinician scrutiny of opioid use has resulted in patients with serious illness facing stigma and other challenges when filling prescriptions for their pain medications or obtaining the prescription in the first place. Thus clinicians, patients, and their families are caught between the responses to the opioid use disorder epidemic and the need to manage pain related to serious illness. The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine sponsored a workshop on November 29, 2018, to examine these unintended consequences of the responses to the opioid use disorder epidemic for patients, families, communities, and clinicians, and to consider potential policy opportunities to address them. This publication summarizes the presentations and discussions from the workshop.

Pain Management and the Opioid Epidemic Dec 29 2022 Drug overdose, driven largely by overdose related to the use of opioids, is now the leading cause of unintentional injury death in the United States. The ongoing opioid crisis lies at the intersection of two public health challenges: reducing the burden of suffering from pain and containing the rising toll of the harms that can arise from the use of opioid medications. Chronic pain and opioid use disorder both represent complex human conditions affecting millions of Americans and causing untold disability and loss of function. In the context of the growing opioid problem, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) launched an Opioids Action Plan in early 2016. As part of this plan, the FDA asked the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to convene a committee to update the state of the science on pain research, care, and education and to identify actions the FDA and others can take to respond to the opioid epidemic, with a particular focus on informing FDA's development of a formal method for incorporating individual and societal considerations into its risk-benefit framework for opioid approval and monitoring.

Relieving Pain in America Jan 26 2020 Chronic pain costs the nation up to \$635 billion each year in medical treatment and lost productivity. The 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act required the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to enlist the Institute of Medicine (IOM) in examining pain as a public health problem. In this report, the IOM offers a blueprint for action in transforming prevention, care, education, and research, with the goal of providing relief for people with pain in America. To reach the vast multitude of people with various types of pain, the nation must adopt a population-level prevention and management strategy. The IOM recommends that HHS develop a comprehensive plan with specific goals, actions, and timeframes. Better data are needed to help shape efforts, especially on

the groups of people currently underdiagnosed and undertreated, and the IOM encourages federal and state agencies and private organizations to accelerate the collection of data on pain incidence, prevalence, and treatments. Because pain varies from patient to patient, healthcare providers should increasingly aim at tailoring pain care to each person's experience, and self-management of pain should be promoted. In addition, because there are major gaps in knowledge about pain across health care and society alike, the IOM recommends that federal agencies and other stakeholders redesign education programs to bridge these gaps. Pain is a major driver for visits to physicians, a major reason for taking medications, a major cause of disability, and a key factor in quality of life and productivity. Given the burden of pain in human lives, dollars, and social consequences, relieving pain should be a national priority.

The Impact of Drug Law Punitiveness on Opioid Overdose Mortality Jun 30 2020 Drug policy has changed over the decades. While the 80's and 90's focused on punitive War on Drugs policies, the 21st Century took an opposite approach. Over the last 20 years, states altered existing drug policies, ended drug offender social service bans, and adopted new public health laws. These changes arrive as the United States faces an opioid epidemic where thousands die from prescription opioids, heroin, and fentanyl. Prior work has examined how these laws impact overdose individually, but little work evaluates how these policies represent state-level punitiveness to drug offenders as a whole. My dissertation assesses state-level drug offender punitiveness and answers three questions: 1) Does various drug policies form a state-level drug law punitiveness scale? 2) What factors impact states altering their level of punitiveness? 3) Does state-level punitiveness affect opioid overdose mortality rates? Policy data originates from State Annotated Codes and the Prescription Drug Abuse Policy System (1999-2018). I merge this data with data from CDC WONDER, CDC'S Bridged Race Data, the Uniform Crime Reports, the American Community Survey, and government sources to answer the above questions. The first study finds that state-level factors create a scale, but not a unidimensional one. Policies load on three different dimensions: Public Health, Collateral Consequence, and Criminal Justice + MML punitiveness. The second study discovers aggregate state-level rational public choice and conflict factors guide states to alter punitiveness. Drug crime rate and percent non-white affect multiple types of punitiveness, while fiscal health and state conservatism influenced only public health punitiveness. No factors influence criminal justice + MML punitiveness. The final study finds no impact of any type of punitiveness on opioid overdose mortality rates. The results have several policy implications. The results explain how states are influenced by not only rational public choice but conflict factors. The findings on overdose death and punitiveness suggest punitive laws alone will not end the opioid epidemic.

Medications for Opioid Use Disorder Save Lives Aug 13 2021 The opioid crisis in the United States has come about because of excessive use of these drugs for both legal and illicit purposes and unprecedented levels of consequent opioid use disorder (OUD). More than 2 million people in the United States are estimated to have OUD, which is caused by prolonged

use of prescription opioids, heroin, or other illicit opioids. OUD is a life-threatening condition associated with a 20-fold greater risk of early death due to overdose, infectious diseases, trauma, and suicide. Mortality related to OUD continues to escalate as this public health crisis gathers momentum across the country, with opioid overdoses killing more than 47,000 people in 2017 in the United States. Efforts to date have made no real headway in stemming this crisis, in large part because tools that already exist—like evidence-based medications—are not being deployed to maximum impact. To support the dissemination of accurate patient-focused information about treatments for addiction, and to help provide scientific solutions to the current opioid crisis, this report studies the evidence base on medication assisted treatment (MAT) for OUD. It examines available evidence on the range of parameters and circumstances in which MAT can be effectively delivered and identifies additional research needed.
