From expansive meditation to haiku, in ode and epistle, dream sequence and elegy, Levin's new poems explore motifs deeply social and historical, personal and metaphysical. The pre-Socratic mathematician Zeno facing the riddle of an ordinary day; a cloudbank of silence; a pair of second-hand shoes bought for Anne Frank; two crows at play above the peak of a mountain; a dot flickering on the horizon: intimate and philosophical, these poems unveil the metamorphic properties of mind and nature.

All We Saw Jan 30 2020 Poems of elegy in the aftermath of a great love from the internationally best-selling, award-winning novelist (Fugitive Pieces, The Winter Vault) and poet. It will be an essential reference source for libraries and scholars involved in Commonwealth studies and will be of particular interest to historians, political scientists, economists, and educators.

A lyrical interweaving of tones and textures invites the reader into the zones between sleep and no-sleep, between the solitude of the dark and the awakening of the light. *The Insomnia Poems* is Grace Nichols's first new collection since *Picasso, I Want My Face Back* (2009). Neither that collection nor this one is included in her *Bloodaxe* retrospective, *I Have Crossed an Ocean* (2010).

Taking Off Apr 02 2020 Collection of poetry by Brian Turner, who is considered to be one of New Zealand's leading poets.
